


# Cowboys



He helps raise fat, healthy beef cattle to sell for food.  
It is springtime on the ranch. That is when all the cowboys  
ride out to round up the newborn calves.




Mac rides into a herd of cows, calves, and bulls.  
He is throwing a rope to catch a calf.





It is time to take the new calves from their mothers for a little while.  
The cowboys want to count the calves to see how many have been born.







Now the men have put the calves into a pen. The cowboys are waving their arms and shouting to make the calves go into a cattle chute. The chute is a narrow path between two high fences. The men count the calves as they go through the chute one by one.





At the end of the chute, each calf is caught and held tight in a special holder. Then the calf is marked so its owner will always know it is his. The mark is called a brand. It is made with a red-hot tool called a branding iron. Smoke rises as the branding iron burns some of the hair on the calf. Did you ever see such a big needle for giving a shot? The needle holds enough medicine for twenty-five calves. As soon as the calves get their shots, they go back to their mothers.



A cowboy holds a branding iron before it is put into a fire to heat.







A horse named Tiger kicks up a cloud of dust. He is inside a wooden fence called a corral. The man holding Tiger has a special job to do. His name is Alex Moses. He will put new shoes on Tiger. The new shoes will help keep Tiger from hurting his hoofs on the rocky ground.




With strong hands, Alex holds one of Tiger's hoofs.  
He has already taken off the old shoe. Now he makes sure  
the hoof is smooth and ready for a new shoe.  
Horseshoes are made of iron,  
and Alex uses a hammer and nails to put Tiger's shoes on.  
Tiger stands quietly while Alex works.  
The nails do not hurt at all. Finally all the shoes are on.  
Alex uses a tool to file the hoof until it is smooth.  
Soon Tiger will clop-clop away on his new shoes.





Sometimes horses get a ride too. Mac and another cowboy are loading two horses into a truck. Mac will drive the truck to a far place on the ranch where there are cows and calves. There he will unload the horses and put on their saddles for the day's work. Mac looks at King's teeth to see if they fit together evenly. A horse must chew well to keep healthy. Mac's wife, Karen, sometimes rides out to help with the ranch work. Here she rides with her daughter, Katie.

round and round.


The whirling wheel

the wheel will be whirling again.









**B**rrr! In winter, cold winds sometimes blow from the north. On a February day Mac rides King out into a snowstorm. Mac wears a warm jacket. King has a thick coat of hair to keep him warm. On cold winter mornings, water may freeze in the stone troughs where the cattle drink. Then Mac breaks the ice so the cattle can have water when they are thirsty. Katie and her two brothers, Ben and Michael, help out. Michael chips at the ice with a big stick. Mac shovels the ice out onto the ground.








The ranch needs miles and miles of fences to keep the cattle from wandering away. As soon as a fence breaks, it must be mended. Mac finds a place where the fence has come loose from a post. He ties it back with a short piece of wire. At another place Mac finds a fence that needs to be tightened. He fastens a tool to the fence and pulls on the long handle. This stretches the fence until it is very tight. When night comes, Mac builds a cheery fire and makes a pot of coffee. After eating a snack, he will put out the fire and ride home.





With a short rope, Mac leads a young horse named Banner. Someday Banner will be a fine saddle horse like King. But first Banner must learn to wear a halter on her head. Mac pulls her along gently so she will not be afraid. Can you guess why Mac is putting a blanket on Banner? No, it is not to keep her warm. The blanket is there so Banner will get used to carrying it. One day Mac will put a small blanket on her back, and then he will put on a saddle like the one King carries. But look out! The blanket is falling off! Too late. The blanket has fallen to the ground. Banner does not like the feel of it yet, and she hits at the blanket with her hoofs. When she is older, Banner will carry her head high as a proud cowboy rides her out to the roundup.







Mac rides fast through thorny brush, twirling his rope.  
Why is he chasing the calf?  
He can see that it has a disease called pinkeye.  
To catch the calf, Mac throws the loop in his rope over the calf's head.  
The calf is soon roped, and Mac and another cowboy  
carefully put medicine on the eye. When they are finished,  
the calf will jump up and scamper away.



Now Michael is going to try to throw a rope  
just the way his dad did to catch the calf.  
Michael makes a loop and goes after his dog Brandy.  
Brandy just scoots out of the way.  
So Michael goes after his dad—and catches him!  
The rope tightens around dad's legs, and down he goes.  
But it's all good fun, and Mac laughs as he hits the ground.







A boy chases a big calf.  
He rides so fast  
that you see just a blur.  
Someday the boy may work on a ranch  
of his own, and he must practice  
riding and roping. He must learn  
to mend fences, work on windmills,  
and take care of cattle. Then one day  
he will be ready to take his place  
as a cowboy in the spring roundup.
